Dr David Howe is senior lecturer in the anthropology of sport and works at the Peter Harrison Centre for Disability Sport at Loughborough University, United Kingdom. David is currently a vice president of IFAPA. His research interests include the cultural politics of the Paralympics, ethics of Paralympism and APA more generally and the impaired sporting body, health and identity. This research is theoretically informed by social theories of embodiment, notably those developed by Bourdieu, Foucault and Merleau-Ponty.

This area of work is being developed through a life-long involvement in, and commitment to, the Paralympic sporting movement.

David's experience as athlete and administrator and latterly journalist and coach, has facilitated access to this rapidly changing sporting environment. His first major publication in this area came out in 2008 entitled The Cultural Politics of the Paralympic Movement: Through the Anthropological Lens. London: Routledge.
